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




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The Story of Our Nuteracker Production

Performances of *The Nutcracker* have grown in a great American and Lehigh Valley tradition. The Lehigh Valley's *Nutcracker* tradition began fifty-six years ago in 1968. It was sponsored by The Junior League of the Lehigh Valley and was initially performed at the Allentown Symphony Hall, under the direction of Alexi Ramov. Through the generous grant contribution from The Junior League of the Lehigh Valley, and countless volunteer hours, the Ballet Guild's *Nutcracker* began.

While the Ballet Guild has undergone numerous changes throughout its own sixty-six-year history, one constant in the organization's seasonal calendar has been our annual *Nutcracker* production. Countless Lehigh Valley children and adults have performed in *The Nutcracker* production under the direction of Alexi Ramov, Oleg Briansky and Mireille Briane, Aram Manukyan and current Artistic Director, Karen Kroninger Knerr. In addition, several Ballet Guild students have returned as professional guest artists to appear in this annual holiday treat. These alumni include Peter Degnan and Susan Taylor Degnan of the Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre; Richard Fritz of the Los Angeles Ballet Company; Leslie Jonas of the Boston Ballet; Karen Kroninger, then of the Juilliard School; and Joseph Fritz of the New Jersey Ballet/Metropolitan Opera Ballet. The Ballet Guild has also brought the magic of *The Nutcracker* to over 100,000 local school students as part of our popular school performances.

Because of the initial contribution of The Junior League of the Lehigh Valley, countless volunteers, the Ballet Guild's Board of Directors, the hard work and dedication of our previous and current artistic directors and dancers, the generous support of our sponsors and donors and the greater Lehigh Valley community, the Ballet Guild is proud to present its fifty-sixth consecutive *Nutcracker* production. Thank you for experiencing the magic and precision that we call *The Nutcracker*. Enjoy the show.



The Story of The Nuteracker

It is Christmas Eve. There is a party in the home of Dr. and Mrs. Stahlbaum, who are decorating the tree with the help of the maids. Clara and Fritz, the children of the house, exclaim with delight as they peep through the keyhole. Relatives and friends arrive for the evening's festivities. Once everyone has settled in, Dr. Stahlbaum organizes games and dances. After the presents have been distributed, there is an ominous occurrence: When the clock chimes, a frightening old owl flaps its wings and lights flicker eerily. The startled children run to their parents, and Herr Drosselmeyer appears at the door. He is a family friend, but nonetheless mysterious, with a patch covering one of his eyes! He has brought his handsome nephew Karl with him, and two boxes, which produce a Mechanical Doll and a Soldier Doll. In addition, there is a Nutcracker for Clara, which he presents to her after he demonstrates how it works. When her brother Fritz mischievously snatches it away and stomps on it, Herr Drosselmeyer repairs the broken Nutcracker's head by tying it in a handkerchief. Soon, all the girls are rocking their dolls to sleep.

The boys harass them by noisily tooting their trumpets and bugles. Herr Drosselmeyer's nephew brings Clara a toy bed so that she can tuck in the Nutcracker for the night, and shortly it is time for everyone to go to bed. Once all the guests have gone, Clara retrieves the Nutcracker, and cradling it in her arms, falls asleep on the sofa, where her mother covers her and lets her sleep. Suddenly, at midnight, Clara is awakened by the chiming of the clock and is terrified to see Herr Drosselmeyer on the Grandfather clock flapping his cape. She jumps up and begins to run but encounters mice scurrying in every direction. In the midst of her dream, the Christmas tree begins to grow! Herr Drosselmeyer appears again, and from the folds of his cape emerges a life-sized Nutcracker. Magically, toy soldiers appear. The Nutcracker marshals them into battle against the mice and their King. At the height of the battle, Clara throws her slipper at the Mouse King, striking and stunning him, and the Nutcracker runs him through with his sword!

Both Clara and the Nutcracker are whisked away by Herr Drosselmeyer; magically they are transported to The Land of Snow under the spell of the Snow Queen and her Cavalier. In The Kingdom of Sweets, the Sugar Plum Fairy makes a regal entry attended by Angels, followed by an array of confectioners. When Clara and Herr Drosselmeyer's nephew—transformed into a Prince—arrive, they are greeted by the Cooks, who invite them to taste some sweets. The Prince and Clara are seated on the throne and view the sumptuous offerings of the Sugar Plum Fairy's Kingdom, including Chocolate from Spain, Coffee from Arabia, Tea from China, Candy Canes, and Marzipan treats. Mother Ginger and her little Polichinelles arrive, as well as Waltzing Flowers and a Dew Drop, and there is a beautiful *pas de deux* by the Sugar Plum Fairy and her Cavalier. At the end of the Finale, everyone bids farewell to Clara and the Prince, as a sleigh carries them off—to where and what we shall never know. Yet, this is the magic and the beauty of *The Nutcracker*.

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Artistic Director



Karen Kroninger Knerr, Artistic Director since 2007, holds a BFA in Dance from the Juilliard School where she trained in Graham, Taylor, and Limon techniques. She was a principal dancer with the Albany Berkshire Ballet, where she performed lead roles in *Cinderella* and *Coppélia*, as well as performing *Girl At Mirror* for the opening of the Norman Rockwell Museum in Stockbridge, MA. In addition, Karen was a member of the Ellen Sinopoli Dance Company. She has worked with and performed works by Dennis Nahat, Laura Dean, Frances Patrelli and Bill T. Jones. Karen holds an Intermediate Certification in Labanotation and is an ABT Certified Teacher, having completed intensive training in the American Ballet Theatre National

Training Curriculum, a high-quality artistic training that is combined with the basics of dancer health and child development. She has developed the outreach program, "Discover Dance", for the Ballet Guild of the Lehigh Valley. Karen teaches students from beginner level to advanced level for BGLV and has choreographed various works including Youth programs for the Allentown Symphony. In August 2019, Karen received her Certification in Progressing Ballet Technique.

Artistic Director Emerita



Mireille Briane entered the Paris Opera Ballet School at age seven, and studied there until her graduation. At the Opera Ballet school, she studied with some of the great teachers and artists of the day, but also found time to major in French literature. By the time she was eight, Mireille was performing regularly on stage, and by age sixteen she had become a Principal Dancer at the Grand Theatre of Bordeaux, France. Later, while appearing with Roland Petit's ballet company, she met and married dancer Oleg

Briansky. The artistic team became world-renowned as ballet teachers and coaches. Mireille Briane also directed children's ballets for television in France and Britain and taught for George Balanchine's School of American Ballet, the Alvin Ailey American Dance Center, and many other prestigious dance organizations. Her version of *The Nutcracker* has been performed in the USA and abroad. From 1995 to 2006, the Brianskys served as artistic and educational directors of the Ballet Guild of the Lehigh Valley and Pennsylvania Youth Ballet. They were the founders and directors of the Briansky Saratoga Ballet Center summer ballet intensive at Skidmore College, Saratoga Springs, New York, which was in operation for 43 years.

Music Director



Darin Lewis began his musical studies at the age of seven. He attended Northwestern University, and continued his studies with Daniel Pollack at the University of Southern California, where he graduated *cum laude*. Upon his graduation, he was awarded a Rotary Scholarship, allowing him to do post-graduate work at the Royal Northern College of Music in England. While in England, Mr. Lewis made his orchestral debut playing Mozart. He returned to the United States, and began work on his Master's degree in Piano Performance at Yale University. At Yale, with the encouragement and guidance of Ezra Laderman and Joan Panetti, Mr. Lewis began to further explore his abilities as a composer. In 1990, Mr. Lewis conducted performances of his *Requiem*

at Yale and in California. In 1991, after graduating from Yale, Mr. Lewis received a Teaching Fellowship at the City College of New York, where he began working on a Master's degree in composition with the Pulitzer Prizewinning composer David Del Tredici. Upon his graduation, Mr. Lewis joined the music faculty of the Horace Mann School. During his tenure at Horace Mann, he composed numerous works for the Orchestra, Concert Band, Symphonic Wind Ensemble, Jazz Ensemble, and Choral groups. Mr. Lewis completed his Doctorate in Music Education at Boston University in 2016. He is an active composer with works being performed throughout the United States having been performed by St. Olaf, Sons Florida's Singing Sons, and the Boston Pops and at venues such as Alice Tully Hall, Southwark Cathedral, Alliance Française, and Carnegie Hall.

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Guest Artists



Beckanne Sisk (Sugar Plum Fairy) began her ballet training with Longview Ballet Theater at the age of five. She studied there until age thirteen when she moved to Philadelphia, PA to attend The Rock School for Dance Education on scholarship. She was a part of the Rock's RAPA program for four years. While there, Sisk won the Jerome Robbins award in 2007, and competed at the Youth America Grand Prix from 2007-2010, placing in 1st and 3rd. Adam Sklute invited her to join Ballet West II in 2010, at age seventeen, after seeing her compete at YAGP. After one year in Ballet West II, she joined the main company as a New Artist in 2011 and then to Principal in 2015. She joined Houston Ballet as Principal Dancer in August 2022.

She has performed the female principal roles in Anna Marie Holmes' *Don Quixote*, John Cranko's *Romeo and Juliet*, and *Onegin*, as well as Adam Sklute's adaptations of *Giselle*, *The Sleeping Beauty*, and *Swan Lake*. Sisk has been noticed by *The Washington Post* in William Christensen's *The Nutcracker*, "one of the most charming and beguiling ballerinas to embody the role in recent memory. She was every bit the fairy-tale queen of one's dreams – regal but warm, expressive but subtly so, who sustained her balances as if mere air held her up, and yet paradoxically, her dominant quality was softness." Also, her performance in Cranko's *Onegin* was recognized by *Pointe Magazine* as one of the Standout Performances of 2019.

Original principal roles have been created on her by many renowned contemporary choreographers such as Nicolo Fonte, Val Caniparoli, Edwaard Liang and Matthew Neenan. She has since become an international guest star.

In addition to her dancing, Sisk was featured on the CW's Breaking Pointe television show for two seasons and has appeared in *Mexico Vogue*. She also won the Bronze Medal in the Beijing International Ballet Competition in June 2012 and was chosen for the 2012 Princess Grace Dance Fellowship Award.



Chase O'Connell (Sugar Plum Cavalier) was born in Fredericksburg, Virginia and started taking dance classes at the age of 2. At age 13, he received a scholarship to train at the Kirov Academy of Ballet in Washington, D.C. He studied under Vladimir Djoulouhadze and Anatoli Kucheruk from 2007 to 2009. In 2009 he received a scholarship to train at the Royal Ballet School in London, England. There, he studied under Meelis Pakri and David Peden. While at school he had the privilege to perform with English National Ballet in their 2010 Nutcracker.

After studying at the Royal Ballet School for 2 years, O'Connell joined the world-renowned Paris Opera Ballet to perform in their 2011 production of Rudolf Nureyev. In 2012 he began

his contract with Ballet West II. He was promoted into the main company in 2013, then promoted to Principal in 2016. He joined Houston Ballet as Principal Dancer in August 2022.

While at Ballet West he has performed principal roles in ballets by John Cranko, Frederick Ashton, George Balanchine, Jiří Kylián, Jerome Robbins, Nicolo Fonte, Stanton Welch AM, and Adam Sklute. He also had contemporary principal roles created on him by Nicolo Fonte, Edwaard Liang, Africa Guzman, and Val Caniparoli.

O'Connell has danced in galas internationally and his performance in *Onegin* was one of *Pointe Magazine's* top performances in 2019.

"He is a dynamic dancer, the consummate prince, and a caring partner to his ballerinas," said Ballet West Artistic Director Adam Sklute.



Stephaen Hood (Snow King, Arabian), a native of Baltimore, began his formal classical training with the Mid-Atlantic Youth Ballet. He later went on to study at the Rock School for Dance Education as a full scholarship recipient. In 2013, he graduated from the University of the Arts receiving a B.F.A. in Classical Ballet. Upon graduation, he performed and studied under Christopher Fleming with Ballet-Fleming. Stephaen was a member of Ohio's Verb Contemporary Ballets for three seasons. He performed works by Anthony Kruztcamp, Heinz Poll, Diane McIntyre, William Forsythe and trained under Cuban National Ballet Director Laura Alonso. He has been a guest artist for the Poetic Expression Dance Company, Carbon Dance Theater and the Ballet Guild of the Lehigh Valley. He has performed lead roles in

ballets such as *Coppélia, La Bayadere, The Nutcracker, Spartacus, & Spring Waters* to name a few. Stephaen has also performed as a soloist for the Ballet Theatre of Maryland for two seasons. Stephaen is currently a freelance artist while working full time as a dance teacher for Anne Arundel County Public Schools.



Tevin Johnson (Harlequin, Candy Cane), a Syracuse, New York native, began his dance training at the age of 15. Johnson attended the Alvin Ailey's Professional Division Summer Dance Intensive on a scholarship in 2013, where he worked with Christian Von Howard, Freddy Moore and Pedro Ruiz Jr. He received a BFA in Dance from Montclair State University, where he was featured in works such as *Running Spirits and Wild and Free* (Draft5) by Fredrick Earl Mosley, Larry Keigwin, Christian Von Howard, Stacey Tookey, and Camille A. Brown. He soon joined Roxey Contemporary Ballet Company in New Jersey for two seasons and worked alongside the company's outreach programs. In 2020, Tevin was added to the faculty of the City College of Manhattan's theater department. He also taught at various studios in

New Jersey. Some of his many awards and honors include the Jenni-Lynn Watson Scholarship, Cento Amici Scholarship, and the 2014 National NAACP ACT-SO Gold Medal for Dance. Tevin was also featured in various publications, such as Young Artist on *Extraordinary People and Places in Central New York* with Carrie Lazarus, and in the 2016 calendar of *Dancers Among Us* by photographer Jordan Matter.

Adult Cast

Karen Amate (Party Guest), retired math and physics teacher at Lehigh Career & Technical Institute, has danced since age three and was a soloist at Ballet Theatre of Scranton, where she studied with Constance Reynolds. She taught ballet for 20 years in Hillsborough, NJ. Karen's many interests include adult ballet classes at BGLV, performing in *The Nutcracker*, playing handbells, performing liturgical dance, and helping prepare Polish foods and other goodies for her church's fundraisers. She is the mother of two sons, Daniel and Jeffrey, both Eagle Scouts. She enjoys spending time with her grandchildren Rosie, Ben, Campbell, and Jill.

Trevor Colahan (*Party Guest*) was born and raised in the Lehigh Valley. He is a lifelong performer having had his first ballet classes in his youth followed by years of theatre, music, and other dance styles. Trevor shares his passion for the arts with his wife, Diana, whom he met when cast as boyfriend and girlfriend in their high school musical, *The Music Man*. They both returned to ballet as adults at the Ballet Guild and continue to share their love of dance with their sons Patrick and Owen. When not performing, Trevor can be found on the Hurling pitch with the Allentown Hibernians or at his day job as a Senior Capital Project Manager for Bristol Myers Squibb.

Oxana Dubrovskaya (Party Guest) arrived in the United States in 2011 with her husband and young daughter from Estonia where the entire family had grown up. A professional artist, painter, sculptor, and until recently a doll doctor and a collector of antique and author dolls, she tried ballet for the first time in the fall of 2017. She began attending Adult Ballet Classes at the Ballet Guild and since then has devoted her time to everything ballet-related. Afraid to even dare to dream about performing on stage, she was thrilled to gain some stage experience by dancing as a Party Guest in previous PYB Nutcracker productions and as a Peasant in PYB's production of Coppélia.

Dave Ebert (Party Guest, Mother Ginger) is thrilled to return to the ballet for the third year in a row. Dave is a digital designer by day and a performing musician by night (lead singer and guitarist for local band RadioOne) and wishes to thank not only the wonderful teachers and staff at PYB, but the other party parents for their patience and guidance during the rehearsal process. Being a part of something this magical and meaningful is something Dave will never forget!

Mike Grigoruk (*Dr. Stahlbaum*) is returning to the performance this year to once again participate in "the greatest holiday party ever." Beginning on stage in 2001 with his daughter Bronte, Mike has been involved both as a party guest and as Dr. Stahlbaum for over 15 years. As Mike says each year about participating in PYB's *Nutcracker*, "What a delightful way to bring in the holiday season, and what a wonderful opportunity to be involved in this first-class production." Mike provides construction management services for CEG (Cedarville Engineering Group) in their Pennsylvania Municipal Engineering Department. His biggest stage critic is his wife, Mary, although he also welcomes performance comments from his children and grandchildren – as long as they're positive...

Sara Massa (Party Guest) is delighted to return to the Ballet Guild's Nutcracker. This marks her tenth year sharing the stage with her daughter Isabella. Sara grew up in CT, where she studied ballet at The Marsha Ismailoff Mark School of Ballet and the Connecticut Ballet Center. She now lives in Bethlehem where she is a full-time mother of four, part-time yoga instructor, and free-time student at the Ballet Guild. Sara is grateful to her husband who helps create time for her to share this experience with their daughter. She is also thankful for her parents and sister who make the yearly trek down from Connecticut to move in and take over during Nutcracker week. Without them, this would not be possible.

Erin Vavra (*Party Guest*) is a life-long admirer of ballet. She has been taking adult ballet classes at the Ballet Guild since 2014. She has performed in the Guild's production of *Coppélia* in 2019. Erin debuted as a party parent in the 2020 virtual performance of *The Nutcracker*. Erin also enjoys swing dancing, costume making and reading. Erin is the owner/director of A Child's Choice Montessori School located in Bethlehem. She is excited to be dancing on stage with one of her former students this year!

Phillip Wallens (Party Guest) is back on stage with the Ballet Guild of the Lehigh Valley for his sixth consecutive performance of *The Nutcracker*. Phillip currently teaches elementary general music in the Bangor Area School District. Despite moving to New Jersey more than a year ago, Phillip returns to Pennsylvania to continue advocating for arts education. He is a music director for two theatres, Star of The Day in Emmaus and Rebels Stages in The Delaware Water Gap. He is on the board of The Friends of Music of Bethlehem, a non-profit dedicated to supporting classical music education in the Lehigh Valley. Phillip has a deep appreciation for the arts and enjoys serving children in discovering their own love for the arts. He would like to thank the directors, office managers, and other performers, both young and seasoned, for their hard work and dedication to the arts.

Joyce Yoder (Mrs. Stahlbaum) is humbled to mark sixteen years appearing as Mrs. Stahlbaum, sharing the stage with hundreds of student and professional dancers.
